Background information

There is a film of *Bridget Jones' Diary*. It is usual for British people living away from home to visit their families at Christmas. Teaching notes

When students have completed the Phrasal verbs: pass exercise, they could choose two phrasal verbs and write their own sentences using these verbs. They could read their sentences to their partner, who could tell them if the sentences are right or not.


