Stephen Hawking

(1942-2018) was a famous scientist in the world of physics, mathematics, and cosmology. He lost his speech when he was twenty-one, due to a rare form of ALS, also known as motor-neuron disease. Hawking continued working as a professor and researcher, although he was forced to communicate using a computer that simulated his voice by interpreting the movements of his head and eves. He also became a popular figure after appearing in an episode of The Simpsons.

Michael J.Fox


(1961 -), the boy in the movie Back To The Future, was diagnosed with. Parkinson's Disease when he was only twenty-nine years old. After a period of depression, he found the strength to appear in public again and continue working, giving his fans a message of hope and determination. He also created the Michael J. Fox Foundation For Parkinson's Research.

When the Mexican painter Frida Kahlo (1907-54) was a child, she suffered. among other diseases, from polio. She then had an accident as a teenager which caused her terrible physical problems for the rest of her life. However, this did not stop her from becoming one of the most famous artists of the twentieth century. She is most known for her self-portraits, but her art also played a key role in Mexican society.
