'A surprise for us! What is it?' Roger and Helen shout. 'I don't know,' says their dad. 'She says that it's a secret. And now it's time for bed.'

'Come on, Dad, one more game.'
'Oh, okay. Then straight to bed!'

GLOSSARY

- she's back: she is home
- suddenly: quickly, when you don't expect it
- surprise: something you are not expecting

The next morning the doorbell rings. Roger and Helen run to open the door. It's Aunt Elizabeth, and she's got a big metal box. She hugs the children. Then she opens the box very carefully. It's full of small pieces of ice. She puts her hand into the ice and she slowly takes out a big egg. 'This egg is from an ice cave in Greenland. It's very special. Now I need your help.'

'What do you want us to do?' ask the children.

'I want to see what happens when we put the egg in a warm place. There is no heating in my office at the museum during the summer,' says Aunt Elizabeth. 'I thought I could leave it here.' Yippee! An experiment!' shout the children.

They get a cardboard box and put the egg inside. Then they put the box next to the radiator in the kitchen.



- hugs: puts her arms around in a friendly way
- **museum:** place with lots of very old and precious objects
- radiator: heater, usually fixed to a wall (see page 11)

Aunt Elizabeth comes to check the egg every day but nothing happens. Then, one day while the children are having their breakfast they hear a noise.

'Look at the egg!' shouts Helen. 'Something's happening. It's cracking.'


Slowly a long beak appears. 'It's a bird,' says Roger.

'No, it isn't,' answers Helen. 'It hasn't got any feathers.'

'Of course it's a bird, stupid. Baby birds haven't got feathers.' The animal opens its beak.

'Let's give it a sausage,' says Roger.

Helen gives a sausage to the animal. The animal is very hungry. It eats five sausages, two cooked tomatoes and six pieces of toast.



- **beak:** hard pointed part of a bird's mouth
- cracking: breaking

toast: grilled bread

A month later the family are having dinner.

'That thing's growing very fast,' says Mum.

'And it's always very hungry,' answers Helen. 'Roger thinks that it's a bird, but I don't think so. It still hasn't got any feathers.'

'What does Aunt Elizabeth say?' asks Mum.

'I don't know, she's away on another trip and she isn't coming back for a few weeks.'

'Let's check what it is,' Dad says and gets up.

At that moment the animal spreads its wings, flies over to the table and grabs Dad's fish. The children laugh. Mum is not so happy. 'Get off the table!' she shouts.

Dad goes to his computer.

'Hey, come and look! I know what it is! It's a pterodactyl.'

'A pterodactyl?' shout the children.

'Yes, they lived a long, long time ago. They're a type of dinosaur. Pterodactyls can fly.'

'Yes, we know that, dad.' say the children and laugh.

Dad sits down at the table. 'Where's my fish?' he asks.

'Look at Dacty, Dad. He's got it' Helen says.

'Now he's got a name,' says Mum. 'Dacty sounds nice. It suits him.'


