DAY 1

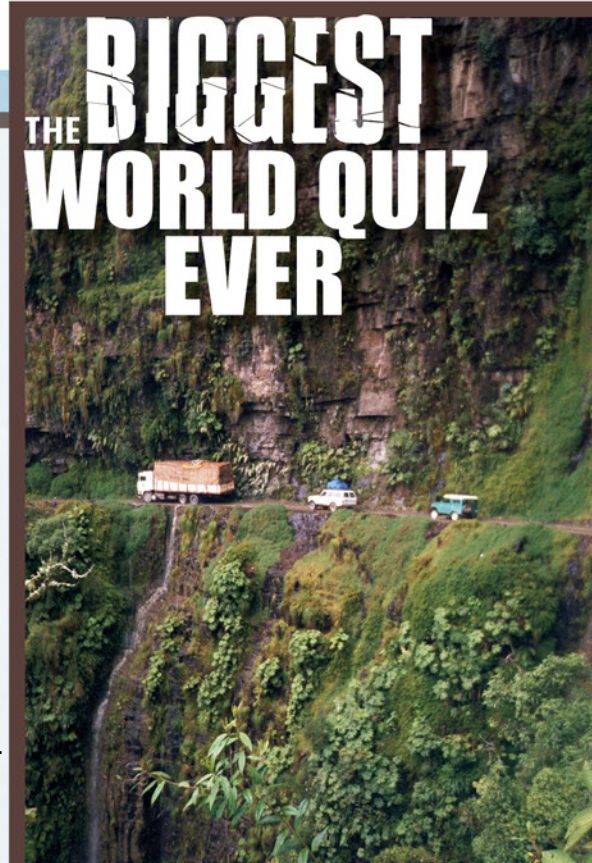

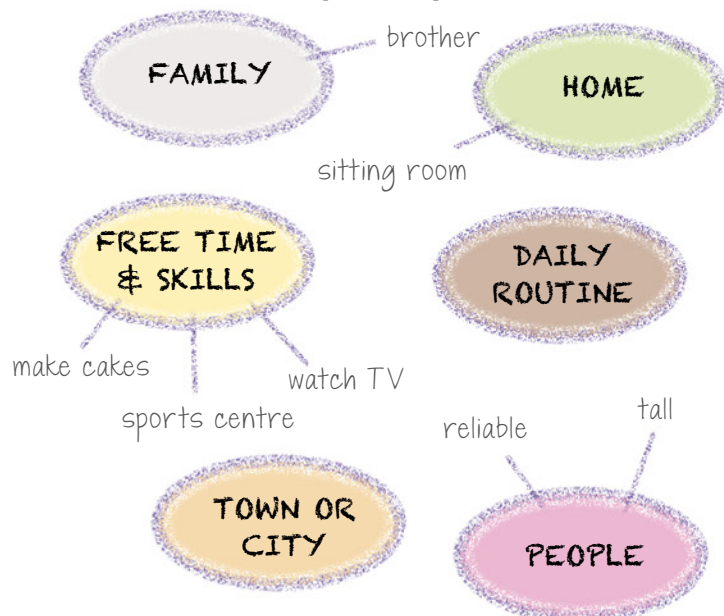

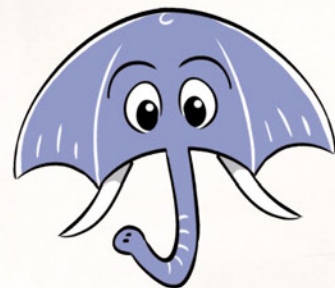
